

Student Majors and Fields of Study

For the 2023 and 2024 academic years, the Aaniiih Nakoda Community Foundation awarded \$188,000 to 94 students.

They attended 37 different trade schools, colleges, and universities nationwide.

Certifications and Degree Programs

At these schools, the students are working on trade school certifications; Associate's, Bachelor's, Master's degrees; and PhD programs.

Certificate programs include industrial trades, esthetician, medical billing

and coding, welding, and massage therapy.

Associate degree studies include Aaniiih and Nakoda languages, American Indian Studies.allied health, computer science, business administration, and counseling,

Bachelor's degree majors include education, business, electrical engineering, computer science, pre-medicine and pharmacy, nursing, ecology, and tribal governance.


Master's degree fields include public administration, public health, social work, agricultural science, psychology, and marriage and family counseling.

PhD programs include business administration, education, and physical therapy.

Students are also studying in medical school, dentistry, and law school to earn their degrees.








Jaidyn Bishop Western Governor's University; Bachelor of Business Administration
